Underground Blast KO's Area Phone Service

John Bonomo, spokes-New York Telephone, said the explosion, which occurred at 10 p.m. last Wednesday night on Ave- ers nue P and East 22nd Street. paralyzed telephone service in a 20-block radius.

Fire Department spokesman Frank McCabe said the explosion was caused by melted ice which leaked and corroded wire insulation.

Eight underground cables were destroyed, either in the blast or in the ensuing fire.

Many of the lines initially thought to have been destroyed were salvaged.

"The water used to extinguish the fire damaged wood residents found them- many of the lines," said selves without phone ser- Bonomo. "After they dried vice last week following an out, several of the lines were saved."

The seven copper cables man for NYNEX, formerly and one fiber optic cable that were destroyed controlled the service for 7,000 to 9,000 NYNEX custom-

> Originally, Bonomo anticipated full restoration would take more than a week, but as of early Monday, workmen were closing in on completion.

> "Our biggest constraint is the tedious process of splicing the more than 7,000 lines onto the new cable," said Bonomo.

> Workmen have labored around the clock since the explosion to repair the lines.

Anticipating the cold

snap, Bonomo had said, "Repair time will slow as the temperature drops down near zero."

A . makeshift wooden shelter was constructed over the site. "While the cold is a problem, the ability to pump heat down into the repair site allowed us to make good progress," the spokesman related.

While repairmen struggled through temperatures dipping down to single digits. NYNEX mobilized temporary services to allay the effects of the downed lines.

Two banks of public telephones were set up, one on Ouentin Road and Marine Parkway, and the other on Avenue O and East 22nd Street.

In the heart of the affected area, Community Hospital, at Kings Highway and East 23rd Street, temporarily lost phone service.

Hospital spokesperson Chris Abate said hospital services were not affected.
