Downtown Cops Board Bikes to Battle Crime

The New York City Police Department is employing new techniques in com-

munity policing throughout the city, one of which has met with a favorable reaction from Brooklyn Heights

and Boerum Hill residents.

Earlier this year, Police Commissioner William Bratton designated 18 precincts throughout New York City to begin mounting some of their Community Policing Officers on mountain bicycles. The 84th Precinct was one of those chosen for the pilot program.

Police Department representatives recently intro-

duced the program to residents at the monthly meeting of the 84th Precinct Community Council.

"We've trained 16 officers in this precinct to ride mountain bikes on patrol," said 84th Precinct Lieutenant Lou Monaghan.

Looks may be deceiving, for the bicycles present the officers with several advantages in combating crime.
